A glimpse into the tribulations of parenting that is part documentary, part therapy, and completely hilarious. It all started when busy father Greg Pembroke posted a few pictures online of his three-year-old son, mid-tantrum, alongside the reason his son was crying: He had broken his bit of cheese in half. In *Reasons My Kid is Crying*, Greg collects together photos sent from parents around the world, documenting the many, completely logical reasons why small children cry. Among them: "I let him play on the grass" ... "He ran out of toys to throw into his pool" ... "The neighbor's dog isn't outside". The result is both an affectionate portrait of the universal, baffling logic of toddlers—and a reminder for burned-out parents everywhere that they are not alone.

The author recounts her experiences with her family's second foster child, a troubled thirteen-year-old girl with Addison's disease who witnessed her mother's suicide attempt, and who was physically abusive of her foster family.

The highly original satire about Oedipa Maas, a woman who finds herself enmeshed in a worldwide conspiracy, meets some extremely interesting characters and attains a not inconsiderable amount of self-knowledge.

also rough. A gang of youths in Robert's class constantly teases him and beats him up. One of them is Martin McDermott, who will prove to be a thorn in Robert's side for many years to come. One day Robert encounters a magpie after she flies in through the attic window and into Robert's life. He named the bird Gale. What Robert doesn't realise is that Gale is not an ordinary bird, as the unlikely friendship grows between the teenager and the magpie, eventually leading them both down a path of crime and burglary that spans over a decade and changes Robert's life forever. Born Crying is an autobiography of a stage door child who was surrounded by many early century stars and grew to become an educator and advocate for children during integration and beyond. The book contains stories about moments with W.C. Handy, Lenny Bruce and other performers from vaudeville and night clubs in the 1940s. It follows Dr. Newton's life through many events in history, the shock of seeing segregation in the South, teaching during the integration of southern schools, the death of President Kennedy, the first man on the moon, and the election of President Barack Obama. But more than that, it reflects on how a lonely little girl, shaken by a tragic accident and perceived kidnapping, married at sixteen and a mother at eighteen, becomes a Doctor of Education who seeks to reform an education system fraught with corruption.
