This dissertation examines the cultural politics and theatrical practices of the contemporary, avant-garde Little Theatre Movement in Taiwan. In the context of a recently democratized island-nation that suffered under oppressive Japanese and Nationalist Kuomintang (KMT) colonial policies throughout most of the twentieth century, Little Theatre practitioners adopted revolutionary theatrical theories and practices as part of their performance-based reform agenda in the early 1980s, strengthening the nascent notion of a nativist "Taiwanese consciousness" and accelerating the "Taiwanization" of Taiwan. My research documents the genealogy of theatre in colonial and post-colonial Taiwan and explores the culture-creating capacities of performance, as Little Theatre practitioners challenged state-sponsored constructions of history, national memory, space, text, language and the body. The embodied, "anthropological" field research methodologies promoted by nativist Taiwanese Little Theatre companies, that I analyze in this dissertation, provide innovative paradigms for future research by theatre practitioners and scholars in countries where there are rapidly changing socio-political conditions.

Beth Conway Shervey examines the cultural consequences of an Equity theatre in a small midwestern farm town. Although many in the Midwest and beyond know the story of The Little Theatre On The Square in Sullivan, Illinois, Shervey is the first to consider what the existence of such a theatre means to perceptions of life in the town. To tell the story of Sullivan and of its star theatre in a cornfield from the perspective of the residents involved, Shervey uses oral history and and dozens of photographs by David W. Mobley, the theatre’s longtime photographer. Sullivan resembles most small towns in the Midwest, and The Little Theatre differs little from most professional summer stock theatres. Yet taken together, the small town and its theatre are clearly unusual, and the existence of the theatre obviously alters perceptions of life in the small town. Before the theatre opened in 1957, Sullivan decidedly was a product of its time: the town sported a strong local chapter of the WCTU, moral people avoided taverns, liberals and Catholics were the minorities, and the population was predominantly white. While the theatre didn't effect instant change, it did introduce people to Sullivan who were obviously different. Stars such as Betty Grable, Cesar Romero, Margaret Hamilton, and Pat O'Brien came into town. Aspiring actors and those behind the scenes also mingled with the residents of Sullivan. As a result, Shervey finds, Sullivan faced such issues as racism, homophobia, urban liberalism, and alcohol consumption at a much faster rate than similar towns. For some, the theatre disrupted a sense of the normal; for others, the theatre made life in Sullivan differerent and interesting, breaking the restrictive bonds typically associated with small towns.

I analyze three of the shows - Very Good Eddie (1915), Oh, Boy! and Leave It to Jane (both 1917) - in the context of dramatic integration and the Little Theatre Movement. I apply the philosophy and tenets of the Little Theatre Movement to encourage a fresh viewing of the Princess shows as legitimate theater. The first chapter of my dissertation is a historical and theoretical one synthesizing the writings of many leaders of the Little Theatre Movement and comparing their artistic aims to those of the creative team at the Princess. In this chapter, I explore the relationships among WWI, the Little Theatre Movement, and the American stage (legitimate and musical). The second, third, and fourth chapters are case studies of the three aforementioned shows. Each begins with an account of the events surrounding the writing and premiere of the musical. I conclude that Kern's scores for the Princess Theatre were indeed integrated to a degree unusual for their time, and that impulses which fostered the Little Theatre Movement also shaped the Princess musicals. Ultimately, this project leads musical theater historians to reconsider the place of musicals in relation to the legitimate theatre and the historiography we construct around the "integrated" musical.
