Conflict and trauma remain among the most prevalent themes in film and literature. Comics has never avoided such narratives, and comics artists are writing them in ways that are both different from and complementary to literature and film. Examples include Alissa Torres's *American Widow*, Doug Murray's *The "Nam*, and Art Spiegelman's much-lauded *Maus*. These works pair with ideas from a wide range of thinkers, including Sigmund Freud, Mikhail Bakhtin, and Fredric Jameson, as well as contemporary trauma theory and clinical psychology. Through these examples and others, *Comics, Trauma, and the New Art of War* proves that comics open up new avenues to explore personal and public trauma in extraordinary, necessary ways.

A tropical hurricane forces the Americans to take shelter within the crypt; they discover it is actually a portal to another world. Transported to the middle of a lopsided battle, the group is forced to choose sides and fight against a huge medieval army. Once the great battle is over, the reality of this new world leaves the sojourners from earth conflicted and searching for answers about reality, God, and eternity. Sean is particularly conflicted about his life as a prodigal and his attraction to Dr. McKenzie. Into the Breach is a war of ideals, a war between living a good life and living an obedient life. Liam Morgan takes the reader through adventure after adventure while unraveling our calling, not to be right, but to be obedient.

HOW TO NOT TELL A WAR STORY is a collection of short stories about veterans who went to war but left without a war story to tell. Forty years after their experience, these veterans begins question if there is something more to say about their military service. Among other things, they come to appreciate the lovers, friends, and family who helped them shape a new, post-war identity. The Art of War of Sun Tzu is often falsely touted as the oldest and first work on military strategy. This myth has become a mindset even in China's ancient historian Ssu-ma Ch'ien sometime between 109 BC and 91 BC penned the questionable biography of Sun Wu in his work Historical Records. Although the canons of the Sun Tzu Ping Fa have been endorsed by many a Western and Chinese military strategist, personage of Sun Wu remains nebulous and the authorship of the work dubious. What is certain is that the Sun Tzu Ping Fa is one of the books on the military art along with fifty four treatises pertaining to military matters that existed at the beginning of the Han Dynasty (206 BC-220 AD). Furthermore, there is sufficient evidence from ancient Chinese texts, historical events and other facts, as well as the structure and terminology within the thirteen chapters of the Art of War itself, to safely conclude that the work is in all probability an anthology from about 240 BC.
