It encourages the reader to ask why a system is designed in a particular way and then proceeds to answer with simplified models.

The text is built around a self-contained core geared toward undergraduate students who have had one year of calculus-based physics. Additional "Track-2" sections contain more advanced material for senior physics majors and graduate students.
