As part of its mandate to guide and define the role of the private sector in poverty reduction and inclusive development, the UNDP Istanbul International Center for Private Sector in Development (IICPSD) produced the “Barriers and Opportunities at the Base of the Pyramid” foundational report. Developed by an interdisciplinary team of 18 leading poverty experts, the report leverages an ecological approach to understanding barriers

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to poverty reduction. The report presents poverty as a complex web of accumulating and interacting disadvantages facing people living in poverty, which in turn, sustain and perpetuate a life of socioeconomic exclusion. The barriers are clustered into five broad categories: Early Developmental Barriers, Health Barriers, Skill Barriers, Social Barriers, and Decision-making Barriers. Using this framework, the IICPSD surveyed a diverse group of practitioners to understand what are some of the opportunities private sector actors can undertake to help tackle these barriers. The report clusters private sector

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actions into four broad approaches, each within its own commercial logic: Corporate Social Responsibility, Social Enterprise, Inclusive Business, and Mainstream Business. Through s survey of policy makers and experts, the report also discusses the role of critical enablers that can facilitate a great role for the private sector in poverty reduction and inclusive development. The report look into how the public sector, international organizations and development agencies, academia, NGOs, Innovative inclusive financing and impact investing, and technology, can catalyze further private

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sector action in poverty reduction. The report ends with a note that if poverty means a life of socioeconomic exclusion for people at the base of the pyramid, the solution is to preclude poverty through social inclusion—and the private sector can play a much more substantial and strategic role towards this end.

'Economic losses from natural disasters totaled \$92 billion in 2015.' Such statements, all too commonplace, assess the severity of disasters by no other measure than the damage inflicted on buildings, infrastructure, and agricultural production.

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But \$1 in losses does not mean the same thing to a rich person that it does to a poor person; the gravity of a \$92 billion loss depends on who experiences it. By focusing on aggregate losses—the traditional approach to disaster risk—we restrict our consideration to how disasters affect those wealthy enough to have assets to lose in the first place, and largely ignore the plight of poor people. This report moves beyond asset and production losses and shifts its attention to how natural disasters affect people's well-being. Disasters are far greater threats to well-being than traditional estimates suggest.

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This approach provides a more nuanced view of natural disasters than usual reporting, and a perspective that takes fuller account of poor people's vulnerabilities. Poor people suffer only a fraction of economic losses caused by disasters, but they bear the brunt of their consequences. Understanding the disproportionate vulnerability of poor people also makes the case for setting new intervention priorities to lessen the impact of natural disasters on the world's poor, such as expanding financial inclusion, disaster risk and health insurance, social protection and adaptive safety nets,

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contingent finance and reserve funds, and universal access to early warning systems. Efforts to reduce disaster risk and poverty go hand in hand. Because disasters impoverish so many, disaster risk management is inseparable from poverty reduction policy, and vice versa. As climate change magnifies natural hazards, and because protection infrastructure alone cannot eliminate risk, a more resilient population has never been more critical to breaking the cycle of disaster-induced poverty.

From the Forward: The cycle of extreme poverty and disease that plagues many of the world's citizens, stems in part from a lack of access to the resources that are in abundance for those of us who have been blessed to live in an environment of wealth and opportunities. But the truth is, we who have access to the blessings of trustworthy medical care and higher education, oftentimes take them for granted and our ingratitude can blind us and harden our

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hearts to the needs of others. I had been employed by HOPE worldwide for thirteen years when I was invited to San Pedro Sula, Honduras in 2009. During those thirteen years, I had traveled extensively throughout the developing world and had helped develop & provide support for the medical programs operated by HOPE worldwide in Afghanistan, Cambodia, Pakistan, India, Ivory Coast and Jamaica. I clearly thought I had seen enough to have a true understanding of the depth of depravation many of our fellow citizens living in 'extreme

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poverty' endured daily, and on some level, I believed that what I had done thus far to help relieve that suffering was good enough. In October 2009, during my visit with the leadership and some of the 450 members of the Iglesia de Cristo in San Pedro Sula, it became crystal clear that God had more for me to do. I learned that the brothers and sisters in Honduras and throughout Central America earned on average less than \$300 per month. Consequently, a family of four could not afford to access medical or dental care and

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many were sick and suffering from chronic illnesses: diabetes, heart disease, hypertension, GERD, and parasite infestation went untreated for years. I could not turn a 'blind eye' to the needs of my brothers and sisters and their children, and I recruited the 1st HOPE worldwide Community Service Brigade Team of 15 volunteers from the United States. We traveled together to Honduras in January 2010 to begin conducting outpatient medical clinics to meet the desperate healthcare needs that I now had a much

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clearer understanding of. A few years later, I realized that our 'patients' health and well-being had dramatically improved. The children were now growing and developing at a normal rate and because they were not sick, they were doing better in school. That's when it hit me, to make real headway into breaking the cycle of poverty, we had to equip people with the tools to go further with their education and advance their careers beyond that \$300 per month brick wall. What was the key that would open these seemingly locked doors, of course, it is

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the English language! The ESOL, 'English for Speakers of other Languages' Program, and this first Student Book has been a labor of love for the original ESOL Team of Bill Ellis, Jeannette Borjas, myself and my wife Lori. We believe it will provide you a solid phonetics-based, English language foundation in all four areas of communication: listening, speaking, reading and writing. And, because the program is rooted in the Bible, we pray you come to a greater understanding of the depth of God's love for you, and as a result you will begin to

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put your faith, hope and trust in Him. Over the past two decades, the percentage of the world's population living on less than a dollar a day has been cut in half. How much of that improvement is because of—or in

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spite of—globalization? While anti-globalization activists mount loud critiques and the media report breathlessly on globalization's perils and promises, economists have largely remained silent, in part because of an entrenched institutional divide between those who study poverty and those who study trade and finance. Globalization and Poverty bridges that gap, bringing together experts on both international trade and poverty to provide a detailed view of the effects of globalization on the poor in developing nations, answering such questions as: Do lower import tariffs improve the lives of the poor? Drawn from a Harvard course developed by their student Matthew Basilico, this work provides an accessible and engaging framework for the study of global health. Insisting on an approach that is

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historically deep and geographically broad, the authors underline the importance of a transdisciplinary approach, and offer a highly readable distillation of several historical and ethnographic perspectives of contemporary global health problems. The case studies presented throughout *Reimagining Global Health* bring together ethnographic, theoretical, and historical perspectives into a wholly new and exciting investigation of global health. The interdisciplinary approach outlined in this text should prove useful not only in schools of public health, nursing, and medicine, but also in undergraduate and graduate classes in anthropology, sociology, political economy, and history, among others. This book focuses on neglected skin diseases and conditions

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in resource-poor countries through the lens of livelihoods. These diseases, when neglected, not only affect the skin, but also joint movement and physical appearance, severely influencing the lives and livelihoods of individuals and families in vulnerable communities. The book explores why neglected skin diseases thrive in resource-poor countries, and considers how this cycle might be broken by looking at the impact on livelihoods and access to healthcare in affected communities. The research is shaped by three guiding questions: Firstly, why have some measures been successful in one part of a population and not the other? Secondly, what is unique about vulnerable populations in various parts of the world? And thirdly, can the cycle of debilitating skin

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diseases and conditions in resource-poor countries be broken? In addressing these concerns, the book excavates past and present efforts in public health measures to combat these diseases, considers the impact of culture and livelihoods, and reviews some of the milestones in disease elimination and eradication. This book will be an indispensable source for health service planners, administrators and practitioners working with vulnerable populations, as well as graduate students and researchers in public health.

In the United States, some populations suffer from far greater disparities in health than others. Those disparities are caused not only by fundamental differences in health status across segments of the population, but also because of inequities in factors that impact health status, so-called determinants of health. Only part of an individual's health status depends on his or her behavior and choice;

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community-wide problems like poverty, unemployment, poor education, inadequate housing, poor public transportation, interpersonal violence, and decaying neighborhoods also contribute to health inequities, as well as the historic and ongoing interplay of structures, policies, and norms that shape lives. When these factors are not optimal in a community, it does not mean they are intractable: such inequities can be mitigated by social policies that can shape health in powerful ways.

Communities in Action: Pathways to Health Equity seeks to delineate the causes of and the solutions to

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health inequities in the United States. This report focuses on what communities can do to promote health equity, what actions are needed by the many and varied stakeholders that are part of communities or support them, as well as the root causes and structural barriers that need to be overcome. This collection addresses human rights and development for researchers, policymakers and activists at a time of major challenges. Ô Critical issues Õ in the title signifies both the urgency of the issues and the need for critical rethinking. After exploring the overarching issues of development and

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economic theory, gender, climate change and disability, the book focuses on issues of technology and trade, education and information, water and sanitation, and work, health, housing and food. He completed his surgical internship and residency through Harvard University at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital and Boston Children's Hospital Medical Center. To continue his work of creating further volunteer surgical services in underserved areas of the developing world, he completed master's and doctoral degrees in international affairs, epidemiology, health promotion and disease prevention, anthropology, tropical medicine,

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educational leadership, and philosophy. Dr. Geelhoed has received numerous recognitions for his work in global healthcare, including the prestigious humanitarian award for outreach to the underserved from the American College of Surgeons, one of the highest honors in the surgical field. He is professor of surgery and international medical education at George Washington University Medical Center in Washington, DC, and is a member of numerous medical, surgical, and international academic societies. Dr. Geelhoed is also an avid game hunter and runner. He has completed more than 165

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marathons across the globe, and he is a widely published author, credited with several books and more than 800 published journal articles. When he is not on overseas M2H missions, he resides at his home in Derwood, Maryland, and enjoys spending time with his two sons and five grandchildren. American children are in crisis. Inner cities are filled with violence and massive drug problems; families are dysfunctional; illiteracy is rising; society's efforts to combat educational failure, poverty, crime, and disease have created an enormous economic debt for the future. In this compassionate and controversial book Irving Harris argues that the key to breaking the cycle of poverty, hopelessness, and violence is very early intervention: we must provide adequate caregiving to children from birth to age three and-to stop the cycle even sooner-we

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must discourage pregnancy among adolescents.
