\*Written by the winners of the Intranews Linguists of the Year award for 2016!\* Discursive and non-discursive interventions in the political arena are heavily mediated by various acts of translation that enable protest movements to connect with their audiences. Egyptian experience since 2011, this volume brings together a unique group of activists who are able to reflect on the complexities, challenges and limitations of one or more forms of translation and its impact on their ability to interact with their audiences. 'Fear makes me a writer, fear and a lack of confidence' Charles Bukowski chronicled the seedy underside of the city in which he spent most of his life, Los Angeles. His heroes were the panhandlers and hustlers, the drunks and the hookers, his beat the racetracks and strip joints and his inspiration a series of dead-end jobs in warehouses, offices and factories. It was in the evenings that he would put on a classical record, open a beer and begin to type.. Brought up by a violent father, Bukowski suffered childhood beatings before developing horrific acne and withdrawing into a moody adolescence. Much of his young life epitomised the style of the Beat generation - riding Greyhound buses, bumming around and drinking himself into a stupor. During his lifetime he published more than forty-five books of poetry and prose, including the novels Post Office, Factotum, Women and Pulp. His novels sold millions of copies worldwide in dozens of languages. In this definitive biography Barry Miles, celebrated author of Jack Kerouac: King of the Beats, turns his attention to the exploits of this hard-drinking, belligerent wild man of literature.

Ask the Dust is a virtuoso performance by an influential master of the twentieth-century American novel. It is the story of Arturo Bandini, a young writer in 1930s Los Angeles who falls hard for the elusive, mocking, unstable Camilla Lopez, a Mexican waitress. Struggling to survive, he perseveres until, at last, his first novel is published. But the bright light of success is extinguished when Camilla has a nervous breakdown and disappears . . . and Bandini forever rejects the writer’s life he fought so hard to attain.

Bringing together a variety of previously uncollected stories, columns, reviews, introductions, and interviews, this book finds him approaching the dynamics of his chosen profession with cynical aplomb, deflating pretensions and tearing down idols armed with only a typewriter and a bottle of beer. Beginning with the title piece—a serious manifesto disguised as off-handed remarks en route to the racetrack—The Mathematics of the Breath and the Way runs through numerous tales following the author ’ s adventures at poetry readings, parties, film sets, and bars, and also features an unprecedented gathering of Bukowski ’ s singular literary criticism. From classic authors like Hemingway to underground legends like d.a. Levy to his own stable of obscure favorites, Bukowski uses each occasion to expound on the larger issues around literary production. The book closes with a handful of interviews in which he discusses his writing practices and his influences, making this a perfect guide to the man behind the myth and the disciplined artist behind the boozing brawler. Born in Andernach, Germany, and raised in Los Angeles, Charles Bukowski (1920–1994) is the author of over forty-five books of poetry and prose. David Stephen Calonne has written several books and edited four previous volumes of uncollected Bukowski for City Lights.

Il cinema, luogo del pop corn, del tempo sprecato e dell'impossibilità di bere un drink in santa pace. È questa l'idea che Bukowski aveva della settima arte. Eppure, a ben vedere, non sono pochi i punti di contatto con il mondo del cinema. Storie di ordinaria follia, Barfly, Factotum. Tre film di rilievo realizzati da registi a loro modo importanti (Marco Ferreri, Barbet Schroeder e Bent Hamer). Il cinema si impossessa delle opere di Bukowski e le restituisce in maniera originale, seguendo un percorso che si allontana dalla fonte letteraria e si avvicina agli intenti degli autori cinematografici. I libri di Bukowski diventano così il pretesto per una nuova analisi: Ferreri amplia il tema cardine del suo cinema, il tentativo dell'uomo moderno di trovare una via d'uscita alla crisi del presente; Hamer si interessa del conflitto insanabile tra artista e sistema, mentre Schroeder si limita a filmare in modo spontaneo le gesta di un ubriacone interessato più alla bottiglia che alla scrittura. Il

risultato, per tutti, sembra uno solo: l'impossibilità di riprodurre il rapporto diretto tra vita e letteratura che contraddistingue tutte le opere di Bukowski. Michele Nardini nel 2010 si laurea all'Università di Pisa con una tesi sui fratelli Taviani e due anni dopo frequenta un Master in Comunicazione pubblica e politica. Attualmente lavora alla Scuola Superiore Sant'Anna (Pi), per la quale ha curato la creazione e la gestione di spazi web-multimediali.
