

## Crisis Intervention With Adolescents A Parent

*Teenagers now face a different world than they would have twenty, even ten years ago. Confronted with new choices and challenges, they grow up exposed to influences both positive and negative. Issues that can arise in high school--fights, sexual abuse, eating disorders--can be overwhelming, and, when teens look for advice, volunteers need to know how to help. Crises are a universal part of the human condition. At one time or another anyone may be called upon to act as a crisis counselor. This comprehensive text deals with the nature and extent of contemporary and long-standing crises, such as AIDS and HIV, issues of parenthood, divorce, abuse, adapting to aging, suicide, and adolescent sexuality. Special topics in crisis counseling, such as spouse abuse, specific population groups, radiation exposure, environmental issues, and unemployment, are also given extensive coverage in this outstanding second edition of *Crisis Counseling: A Contemporary Approach*. Especially intended for care providers from all disciplines who endeavor to help people deal with conflicts and demands, this book will also be useful to those outside of the health professions who regularly engage in crisis counseling, such as teachers, managers, and members of the clergy.

One problem in the treatment of children and adolescents is the unacceptably high levels of patient attrition during the course of mental health treatment. Many states have initiated mental health reforms for this population and utilize the system of care model. The systems of care models are specifically designed to provide more collaborative, individualized community based services. There is an increasing number of services that provide in-home therapy created to reduce barriers to treatment many families may encounter. Although these programs are becoming available within many communities, there still continue to be high rates of patient and family attrition. To explore variables associated with the completion and non-completion of an in-home emergency crisis intervention among children and adolescent in two Connecticut catchment areas, 450 cases from the year 2003 were used for this study from a large community mental health agency in central Connecticut. The results showed that prior psychiatric hospitalization, higher levels of reported poverty and being prescribed medication were associated with completion of the program. In addition, results also showed that children who have caretakers with mental illness were less likely to complete the program.
