This study uncovers the traditions behind the formative Classic Shàngshū (Venerated Documents). It is the first to establish these traditions—“Shū” (Documents)—as a historically evolving practice of thought-production. By focusing on the literary form of the argument, it interprets the “Shū” as fluid text material that embodies the ever-changing cultural capital of projected conceptual communities. By showing how these communities actualised the “Shū” according to their changing visions of history and evolving group interests, the study establishes that by the Warring States period (ca. 453–221 BC) the “Shū” had become a literary genre employed by diverse groups to legitimize their own arguments. Through forms of textual performance, the “Shū” gave even peripheral communities the means to participate in political discourse by conferring their ideas with ancient authority. Analysing this dynamic environment of socio-political and philosophical change, this study speaks to the Early China field, as well as to those interested in meaning production and foundational text formation more widely.

This book examines the creation, characteristics, and tribulations of the first United States National Recreation Area. First named the Boulder Dam Recreation Area, this parkland was created in 1936 by a memorandum of agreement between the National Park Service and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. In early twentieth-century America, affluent city-dwellers made a habit of venturing out of doors and vacationing in resorts and national parks. Yet the rich and the privileged were not the only ones who sought respite in nature. In this pathbreaking book, historian Colin Fisher demonstrates that working-class white immigrants and African Americans in rapidly industrializing Chicago also fled the urban environment during their scarce leisure time. If they had the means, they traveled to wilderness parks just past the city limits as well as to rural resorts in Wisconsin and Michigan. But lacking time and money, they most often sought out nature within the city itself--at urban parks and commercial groves, along the Lake Michigan shore, even in vacant lots. Chicagoans enjoyed a variety of outdoor recreational activities in these green spaces, and they used them to forge ethnic and working-class community. While narrating a crucial era in the history of Chicago's urban development, Fisher makes important interventions in debates about working-class leisure, the history of urban parks, environmental justice, the African American experience, immigration history, and the cultural history of nature.

A lively survey encompassing the Orient, the Americas, and the classical world From the Olympic Games of Greece to the gladiatorial contests of Rome, sport in the ancient world was fiercely competitive and included a wider range of physical contests than we moderns might suspect. The early Chinese played forms of polo and golf, while half a world away, Hohokam and Maya Indians enjoyed team ball games. Nigel Crowther, a leading authority on classical Greek sport, here casts his net over the entire ancient world to reveal the variety, and often the intensity, of sport in earlier times, from 3000 b.c.e. to the Middle Ages. Taking in twenty premodern societies on five continents—with particular emphasis on ancient Greece and Rome and the Byzantine Empire—he traces connections to modern sporting attitudes, practices, and institutions as he describes how athletics figured in cultural arenas that extended beyond physical prowess to ritual, social status, military associations, and

politics. Crowther takes us back to the birth of sumo wrestling in Japan and describes the sports of the Sumerians and Hittites. He documents bull leaping and boxing as recorded on pottery in Crete, as well as running and archery as practiced by the pharaohs in Egypt. He shows the significance of the early Olympic Games, describes the Romans' use of gladiatorial contests for political ends, and analyzes the influence of Byzantine chariot racing on society. He also notes the changing role of women in ancient sports—from their prominence in Egyptian contests, to the mythological Atalanta, to female Roman gladiators. As informative as it is entertaining, *Sport in Ancient Times* opens new vistas for general readers, students, and sport historians. It offers a broad look at ancient sport and will enrich readers' appreciation of games they enjoy today.

*City of Play* shows how play is built into the very fabric of the modern city. From playgrounds to theme parks, skittle alleys to swimming, countless uncontrolled spaces which the urban habitat affords – play is by no means just a childhood affair. A myriad essentially unproductive pursuits have, through time, modelled the modern city and landscape. Architect and scholar Rodrigo Pérez de Arce's erudite, original, and detailed study explores a curiously neglected dimension of architectural design and practice: ludic space. It is an architectural history of the play from the hippodrome to the Situationist city – of space released from productive ends in the pursuit of leisure. But this is more than just a book about architecture: as architecture has incorporated play into its spaces and structures, it is a history of the modern city itself. The ludic imagination impregnates the city with its ideals, and what begins with the playground ends with a re-consideration of the whole sweep of the modern movement through the filter of play. Because play is such a basic or fundamental human experience, the book re-grounds the architect's concerns with those of non-architects – those of adults but also of children. It seeks to give everyone – architects and other ordinary city-dwellers alike – a better understanding of their stake in the making of the public spaces of our cities.

Leisure is a key aspect of modern living. How did our ancestors experience recreation in the past, and how does this relate to the present? In these questions, Peter Borsay examines the history of leisure in Britain over the past 500 years, analysing elements of both continuity and change. *Leisure* - Explores a range of pastimes, from festive culture and music to tourism and sport - Emphasises a conceptual and critical approach to a simple narrative history - Covers a range of themes including economy, state, class, identities, place, space and time - Treats the constitution of the British Isles as a fluid and dynamic amalgam of local and national cultures and politics Authoritative and engaging, this text challenges conventional views on the history of leisure and suggests new approaches to the subject. This book studies attitudes toward secular literature during the later Middle Ages. Exploring two related medieval justifications of literature—finding hygienic or therapeutic value in entertainment, and another stressing the psychological and ethical rewards of taking time out to refresh oneself—Glending Olson reveals that, contrary to much recent opinion, many medieval writers and thinkers accepted delight and the goals of literature without always demanding moral profit as well.
