The play explores the social and economic constraints of individuals in a rural community in England. Although the majority of the work follows the tale of Val, a woman who grapples with the

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decision to leave her family, the other characters are given considerable stage time as well. The struggle of women to gain agency is explored in the situations of other characters, from defiant Nell to abused

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Becky to resigned Shirley. The play delves into the impossibility of escape as the individuals struggle to release themselves from their situation yet must continue to face its realities and the repercussions of their
