

Guilty No Chattels To Be Hanged

Over the last forty years, Sir John Baker has written on most aspects of English legal history, and this collection of his writings includes many papers that have been widely cited. Providing points of reference and foundations for further research, the papers cover the legal profession, the inns of court and chancery, legal education, legal institutions, legal literature, legal antiquities, public law and individual liberty, criminal justice, private law (including contract, tort and restitution) and legal history in general. An introduction traces the development of some of the research represented by the papers, and cross-references and new endnotes have been added. A full bibliography of the author's works is also included.

Ann Forbes, a girl of about fourteen years, from the Parish of

Saint Olave, Borough of Southwark, Surrey, England, was convicted in 1787 of stealing 10 yards of printed cotton material and sentenced to be hanged. Two weeks later the sentence was commuted to transportation. Ann arrived in New South Wales in January 1788 and formed an association with George Bannister a convict. They had a daughter in 1789 and were sent to Norfolk Island in 1790. In 1791, Ann formed an association with William Dring. They were married in November 1791. They had three children, 1792-1796. The family returned to Sydney, New South Wales, in November 1794. After 1796, William disappeared from the records and may have died. Ann formed an association with Thomas Jones (ca. 1770-1854), a convict, ca. 1797. He later changed his name to Thomas Huxley. They had ten children, 1798-1818. Thomas was granted land in the Hawkesbury district near Pitt City, in 1798. Ann died at Lower Colo, New South Wales, in 1851. Most children and grandchildren lived in New South Wales.

This volume, first published in 1977, brings together eleven studies of crime and the administration of the criminal law in England during the early modern period. They represent a variety of approaches - legal, historical and sociological - to the study of historical crime. The initial essay in this study, which is written from a legal standpoint, is the first coordinated account of the structure of criminal law administration in this formative period. It is followed by investigations into the nature and incidence of crime, court appearance and punishment, separate studies of witchcraft, infanticide and poaching, and an account of conditions in eighteenth-century Newgate. This book will be of particular interest to students of criminology and history.

**Published in 1915, this collection of the transactions of the quarter sessions held in Yorkshire West Riding contains the orders for 1611-33 and the indictments and orders for 1637-42. This volume forms a companion to the 1888 edition of West Riding session rolls for 1597-1602, also edited by John Lister (1847-1933), who here provides a lengthy introduction in which he gives an account of the various indictable offences specified in the court records. These include housebreaking, arson, murder, and riotous assembly, as well as absence from church and selling meat during Lent, among others. Court orders are concerned with such subjects as vagrancy, bastardy, alehouses, soldiers, and the plague. The texts themselves, which in this volume are all in English, typically state the indictment, describe the incidents of the trial, if any, and give the verdict in each case.
