Today sharecropping is history, though during World War II and the Great Depression sharecropping was prevalent in Louisiana's southern parishes. Sharecroppers rented farmland and often a small house, agreeing to pay a one-third profit from the sale of crops grown on the land. Sharecropping shaped Louisiana's rich cultural history, and while there have been books published about sharecropping, they share a predominately male perspective. In *A Cajun Girl's Sharecropping*, Viola Fontenot adds the female voice into the story of sharecropping. Spanning from 1937 to 1955, Fontenot describes the daughter of a sharecropper in Church Point, Louisiana, including details of field work as well as the domestic art culture. The account begins with stories from early life, where the family lived off a gravel road near the woods with no running water, or bathrooms, and a mule-drawn wagon was the only means of transportation. To gently introduce the her native language, the author often includes French words along with a succinct definition. This becomes an important part of the story as Fontenot attends primary school, where she experienced prejudice for speaking French, a forbidden and

act. Descriptions of Fontenot's teenage years include stories of going to the boucherie; canning blackberries, figs, and using the wood stove to cook dinner; washing and ironing laundry; and making moss mattresses. Also included in the explanations of rural Cajun holiday traditions, courting customs, leisure activities, children's games, and Saturday night dances for family and neighbors, the fais do-do.

I Have a Story to Tell You is about Eastern European Jewish immigrants living in Montreal, Toronto, and Winnipeg in the twentieth century. The stories encompass their travels and travails on leaving home and their struggles in the sweatshops of the garment industry in Canada. Basing her work on extensive interviews, Seemah Berson recreates the immigrants' stories about their lives in the Old Country and the hardship of finding work in Canada, and she tells how these newcomers ended up in the needle trades. Revealing a fervent sense of socialist ideology acquired in the crucible of the Russian Revolution, the stories tell of the influence of Jewish culture and traditions, of personal-and organized-fight against exploitation, and of struggles to establish unions for better working conditions. This book is a wonderful resource for Canadian, Jewish, and social history, as well as auto/biography and cultural studies. The simplicity of the language, taken from oral reports, makes this work accessible to anyone who enjoys a good story.

The perfect gift to honor any mom, this mini edition of NYT bestselling author Greg Lang's classic, Why a Daughter Needs a Mom will be the perfect gift for a girl's most trusted friend.

The story of a Cameroonian girl (a firstborn child) considered and named ill-lick giver, abandoned by her father, and challenged by a culture that cherish their firstborn to be male.

The pages within this book were penned in fulfillment of a deathbed promise to a long-suffering mother. They are the work of a novice. But it struck me as I read them that this is the work's strength. One of the attractions of the memoir form is that there are often rich ironies to be tilled in looking back. In this true account, born of a bygone era and steeled in the stoic immigrant ethos of a previous generation, a poor, barely literate Italian mother betrayed in marriage and left to fend for herself, struggles against a relentless succession of odds to forge a little corner of life for her family in the New World. Recounted by a daughter who loved her, suffered with her, and survived, the prose is so simple and naked of artifice, it is the reader, rather than the author, who rubs against these ironies. And that, for my money, is literature. Something about this story, which I can not deconstruct to the point of fully identifying, made it a compelling read for me. Calypso, with its diverse cultural heritage, was the most significant Caribbean musical form from World War I to Trinidad and Tobago Independence in 1962. Though wildly popular in mid-1950s America, Calypso--along with other music from "the island of the hummingbird"--has been largely neglected or forgotten. This first-ever discography of the first 50 years of Trinidadian music includes all the major artists, as well as many obscure performers. Chronological entries for 78 rpm recordings give bibliographical references, periodicals, websites and the recording locations. Rare field recordings are cataloged for the first time, including East Indian and Muslim community performances and Shango and Voodoo rites. Appendices give 10-inch LP (78 rpm), 12-inch LP (33 1/3 rpm), extended play (ep) and 7-inch single (45) listings. Non-commercial field recordings, radio broadcasts and initially unissued sessions also are listed. The influence of Trinidadian music on film, and the "Calypso craze" are discussed. Audio sources are provided. Indexes list individual artists and groups, recording titles and labels.
