There is more material than can be covered in a semester and instructors will need to make selections and perhaps use certain topics as honors or extra credit projects. To provide some help for students in analyzing proofs of theorems, there is an appendix on "Logic and Proofs" that discusses topics such as implications, negations, contrapositives, and different types of proofs. However, it is a more useful experience to learn how to construct proofs by first watching and then doing than by reading about techniques of proof. Results and proofs are given at a medium level of generality. For instance, continuous functions on closed, bounded intervals are studied in detail, but the proofs can be readily adapted to a more general situation. This approach is used to advantage in Chapter 11 where topological concepts are discussed. There are a large number of examples to illustrate the concepts, and extensive lists of exercises to challenge students and to aid them in understanding the significance of the theorems. Chapter 1 has a brief summary of the notions and*

***notations for sets and functions that will be used. A discussion of Mathematical Induction is given, since inductive proofs arise frequently. There is also a section on finite, countable and infinite sets. This chapter can be used to provide some practice in proofs, or covered quickly, or used as background material and returned to later as necessary. Chapter 2 presents the properties of the real number system. The first two sections deal with Algebraic and Order properties, and the crucial Completeness Property is given in Section 2.3 as the Supremum Property. Its ramifications are discussed throughout the remainder of the chapter. In Chapter 3, a thorough treatment of sequences is given, along with the associated limit concepts. The material is of the greatest importance. Students find it rather natural although it takes time for them to become accustomed to the use of epsilon. A brief introduction to Infinite Series is given in Section 3.7, with more advanced material presented in Chapter 9. Chapter 4 on limits of functions and Chapter 5 on continuous functions constitute the heart of the book. The discussion of limits and***

***continuity relies heavily on the use of sequences, and the closely parallel approach of these chapters reinforces the understanding of these essential topics. The fundamental properties of continuous functions on intervals are discussed in Sections 5.3 and 5.4. The notion of a gauge is introduced in Section 5.5 and used to give alternate proofs of these theorems. Monotone functions are discussed in Section 5.6. The basic theory of the derivative is given in the first part of Chapter 6. This material is standard, except a result of Caratheodory is used to give simpler proofs of the Chain Rule and the Inversion Theorem. The remainder of the chapter consists of applications of the Mean Value Theorem and may be explored as time permits. In Chapter 7, the Riemann integral is defined in Section 7.1 as a limit of Riemann sums. This has the advantage that it is consistent with the students' first exposure to the integral in calculus, and since it is not dependent on order properties, it permits immediate generalization to complex- and vector-valued functions that students***

***may encounter in later courses. It is also consistent with the generalized Riemann integral that is discussed in Chapter 10. Sections 7.2 and 7.3 develop properties of the integral and establish the Fundamental Theorem and many more***

The course material is deeply intertwined with the exercises, as it is intended that the student actively learn the material (and practice thinking and writing rigorously) by proving several of the key results in the theory.

Clearly balancing theory with applications, this book describes both the conventional and less common uses of linear regression in the practical context of today's mathematical and scientific research. Beginning with a general introduction to regression modeling, including typical applications, the book then outlines a host of technical tools that form the linear regression analytical arsenal, including: basic inference procedures and introductory aspects of model adequacy checking; how transformations and weighted least squares can be used to resolve problems of model inadequacy; how to deal with influential observations; and polynomial regression models and their variations. The book also includes material on regression models with autocorrelated errors, bootstrapping regression estimates, classification and regression trees, and regression model validation.

Introduction to Analysis is an ideal text for a one semester course on analysis. In this way the subject is developed naturally: students will end up not only understanding analysis, but also enjoying it.

The aim is to challenge and improve mathematical intuition rather than to verify it. The philosophy of this book is to focus attention on questions which give analysis its inherent fascination. Each chapter begins with the discussion of some motivating examples and concludes with a series of questions.

The first edition won the award for Best 1990 Professional and Scholarly Book in Computer Science and Data Processing by the Association of American Publishers. There are books on algorithms that are rigorous but incomplete and others that cover masses of material but lack rigor. Introduction to Algorithms combines rigor and comprehensiveness. The book covers a broad range of algorithms in depth, yet makes their design and analysis accessible to all levels of readers. Each chapter is relatively self-contained and can be used as a unit of study. The algorithms are described in English and in a pseudocode designed to be readable by anyone who has done a little programming. The explanations have been kept elementary without sacrificing depth of coverage or mathematical rigor. The first edition became the standard reference for professionals and a widely used

**text in universities worldwide. The second edition features new chapters on the role of algorithms, probabilistic analysis and randomized algorithms, and linear programming, as well as extensive revisions to virtually every section of the book. In a subtle but important change, loop invariants are introduced early and used throughout the text to prove algorithm correctness. Without changing the mathematical and analytic focus, the authors have moved much of the mathematical foundations material from Part I to an appendix and have included additional motivational material at the beginning. Advanced Calculus reflects the unifying role of linear algebra to smooth readers' transition to advanced mathematics. It fosters the development of complete theorem-proving skills through abundant exercises, for which answers are provided at the back of the book. The traditional theorems of elementary differential and integral calculus are rigorously established, presenting the foundations of calculus in a way that reorients thinking toward modern analysis.
