Hispanic literature criticism presents a selection of the best criticism of works by major Hispanic writers of the past one hundred years. The seventh edition of *Types of Drama* provides a complete course in drama in an easily portable book. This text offers a full range of plays from ancient Greece to the present, along with an introductory chapter on how to read plays; biographical notes for each dramatist; introductory comments for each play; topics for critical thinking and writing for each play; critical contexts (for instance, interviews with the authors) for fourteen plays; stage histories for most plays, often including reviews or interviews with directors; five photo-essays: "The Language of Drama"; "Ancient Greek Drama Today"; "Staging Shakespeare Today"; "African Americans on the Stage"; and "Representations of Gender in the Theater"; eleven short historical essays, such as "A Note on Hispanic-American Theater" and "A Note on Women's Theater"; and a substantial glossary of dramatic terms.

For more than twenty years, Luis Valdez, the most distinguished Latino playwright and director, has reserved most of his scripts for live stage productions. His two landmark published collections, *Early Works* and *Zoot Suit and Other Plays*, are only a sampling of his early master works and of the later plays that made it to the stage in the 1980s. Now, Valdez has finally opened his trunk to release print editions of a revised early work and two brand new, major dramas. *Mummified Deer* is Valdez's mature exploration of the Yaqui Indian roots of Mexican American culture and Valdez's own family. Returning to the format of the tent show, Valdez mines maternal psychology and Yaqui mysticism to demand that characters scale the full gamut of emotions. In this gut-wrenching piece, Mama Chu is the dominant, imposing figure who must reconcile the present with the past and unify the conflicting histories and identities of her family. *Mundo Mata* is the long-awaited drama of unionizing farm workers battling the agribusiness power structure in California while Mexican Americans are being sent off to battle brown-skinned enemies in Vietnam. Valdez assesses the toll that families have to pay to remain united against divisive forces. It all comes down to Reymundo, the antihero, who in the end must weigh existential and political questions. *The Shrunken Head of Pancho Villa*, Valdez's re-worked first play, still holds all the vision, spunk, and innovation of the young playwright. Injecting black humor into domestic drama, disembodied heads talk, mothers exchange roles with the patriarch, pachucos banter, and sell-outs become the mouthpieces for an oppressed community,,all characters and themes that would dominate future plays of Valdez and subsequent Chicano literature.

Advisor of Leadership at Google and former vice president of leadership at LinkedIn claims that the biggest driver of motivation is the chance to serve a larger purpose beyond our careers and ourselves, rather than salary, benefits, bonuses, or other material incentives; companies that are able to successfully focus their people, their teams, and their culture around meaning outperform their competition. Fred Kofman's approach to leadership has little to do with the standard practices taught in business school and traditional books.

Bringing together economics and business theory, communications and conflict resolution, family counseling and mindfulness mediation, Kofman argues in *The Meaning Revolution* that our most deep-seated, unspoken, and universal anxiety stems from our fear that our life is being wasted--that the end of life will overtake us when our song is still unsung. Material incentives--salary and benefits--account for perhaps 15 percent of employees' motivation at work. The other 85 percent is driven by a need to belong, a feeling that what we do day in and day out makes a difference, that how we spend our time on earth serves a larger purpose beyond just ourselves. Kofman claims that transcendental leaders, wherever they are in

the hierarchy, are able to put aside their self-interests and help others to feel connected with others on a team or in an organization on a great mission and part of an ennobling purpose. He argues that every organization involved in work that is nonviolent and non-addictive has what he calls an "immortality project" at its core. And the challenge for leaders is to identify and expand on that core, to inspire all stakeholders to take part.

In science fiction and popular culture, Latinxs and Latinx immigrants are often correlated with invading space aliens. At times serious, at other times a farce, this correlation is typically meant in a derogatory way to portray Latinxs as foreign and threatening the nation. In *The Latinx Files*, Matthew David Goodwin traces how Latinx science fiction writers are reclaiming the space alien from its xenophobic legacy in the science fiction genre. The book argues that the space alien is a vital Latinx figure which is preserving Latinx cultures by activating the myriad possible constructions of the space alien to represent race and migration in the popular imagination. The works discussed in this book, including those of Gloria Anzaldúa, Junot Díaz, Lalo Alcaraz, and many others, often explicitly reject the derogatory correlation of the space alien and Latinxs, while at other times, they contain space aliens that function as a source of either enlightenment or horror for Latinx communities. Throughout this nuanced analysis, *The Latinx Files* demonstrates how the character of the space alien has been significant to Latinx communities and has great potential for future writers and artists.

A group of students who attend the Utah high school where the original *High School Musical* movies were filmed prepare for their fall production of *High School Musical*. The play was inspired by the Ranong human-trafficking incident in which 121 people were trafficked from Burma into Thailand and left in a water tank, which was then abandoned by its drivers, only to be discovered after 54 of the people in the container had died. This event is mirrored in the backstory of *She Has a Name*. Kooman had previously written other pieces of literature that had been published, such as the young-adult novel *Ten Silver Coins: The Drylings of Acchora*, but this was his first full-length play. He wrote the one-act version under the guidance of a dramaturge at a workshop run by *Scripts At Work*, where the play received the *Scripts At Work/Alberta Playwrights Network Award*. Stephen Waldschmidt soon joined Kooman in working on the script, expanding it to a full-length play with an extra hour's worth of material by the end of 2010. The stage premiere of *She Has a Name* was directed by Waldschmidt and was performed at the EPCOR Centre for the Performing Arts in Calgary, Alberta in February 2011. Performances ran from February 23 until March 12 in both Calgary and Red Deer; all of these performances were sold out. By February 2012, Kooman was working on a screenplay version of the play in order to expose it to a larger audience. From May to October 2012, *She Has a Name* was on a fringe theatre tour across Canada. After the Saturday matinee in each city, there was a panel discussion to raise awareness about human trafficking. In conjunction with the...
