The *Secret History of Wonder Woman* is a tour de force of intellectual and cultural history. *Wonder Woman*, Lepore argues, is the missing link in the history of the struggle for women's rights--a chain of events that begins with the women's suffrage campaigns of the early 1900s and ends with the troubled place of feminism a century later.
