Baron Roman Fedorovich von Ungern-Sternberg (1885–1921) was a Baltic German aristocrat and tsarist military officer who fought against the Bolsheviks in Eastern Siberia during the Russian Civil War. From there he established himself as the de facto warlord of Outer Mongolia, the base for a fantastical plan to restore the Russian and Chinese empires, which then ended with his capture and execution by the Red Army as the war drew to a close. In The Baron's Cloak, Willard Sunderland tells the epic story of the Russian Empire's final decades through the arc of the Baron's life, which spanned the vast reaches of Eurasia. Tracking Ungern's movements, he transits through the Empire's multinational borderlands, where the country bumped up against three other doomed empires, the Habsburg, Ottoman, and Qing, and where the violence unleashed by war, revolution, and imperial collapse was particularly vicious. In compulsively readable prose that draws on wide-ranging research in multiple languages, Sunderland recreates Ungern's far-flung life and uses it to tell a compelling and original tale of imperial success and failure in a momentous time. Sunderland visited the many sites that shaped Ungern's experience, from Austria and Estonia to Mongolia and China, and these travels help give the book its arresting geographical feel. In the early chapters, where direct evidence of Ungern's activities is sparse, he evokes peoples and places as Ungern would have experienced them, carefully tracing the accumulation of influences that ultimately came together to propel the better documented, more notorious phase of his career Recurring throughout Sunderland's magisterial account is a specific artifact: the Baron's cloak, an essential part of the cross-cultural uniform Ungern chose for himself by the time of his Mongolian campaign: an orangey-gold Mongolian kaftan embroidered in the Khalkha fashion yet outfitted with tsarist-style epaulettes on the shoulders. Like his cloak, Ungern was an imperial product. He lived across the Russian Empire, combined its contrasting cultures, fought its wars, and was molded by its greatest institutions and most volatile frontiers. By the time of his trial and execution mere months before the decree that created the USSR, he had become a profoundly contradictory figure, reflecting both the empire's potential as a multinational society and its ultimately irresolvable limitations. At the edge of empires lies Finland, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. They actually live on the edge of a number of empires. To the west lies Sweden. Sweden was once a great power in the Baltic region. The Swedish empire at its height covered today's Finland, part of Russia, Estonia as well as parts of what is today Germany and Poland. Sweden even held Norway for a time. To the east lies Imperial Russia and, later, the Soviet Union. The Russian empire covered a vast area at one time, including the Baltic states and Finland. It also fought wars with Sweden to gain other, former, Swedish territory in the area. After its collapse, the Soviet Union took its place. The Baltic states and Finland broke free but the Baltic states didn't stay independent for long and eventually became part of the USSR during the Second World War. Another empire laid to the South; the German Empire, and later, Nazi Germany. Imperial Germany had a great influence on Finland and Nazi Germany briefly occupied the Baltic states and fought with Finland against the Soviet Union.This varied history leaves quite a bit of interest, for the military enthusiast, in the area. We will take a tour through time and space, from the days when Sweden ruled in the area, through to the German invasions of the First and Second World Wars and onto the Soviet occupation of the Baltic states and finally to the modern, post Soviet, World. I have divided the book into sections. Starting with the individual soldier's kit and uniform. After that I will look at a sample of the vehicles found on the edge of so many empires. This will include, of course, many Soviet vehicles, like the BMP-1 as it was used by Finland as well, but also some home grown vehicles such as the Finnish Patria Pasi. There are also vehicles from other countries such as Sweden, so we will have quite a few overlaps. For the artillery part, I will be a bit generous with my definition of "artillery" and include things like grenades. I will then move on to radios before I get to aircraft. Next, I will look to seaborne craft. After that, I will look at bases. Again, I'm generous with my definition of bases and will include any location with a military connection. Then we will look at some battlefields. The area has seen many battles and I include some of the famous ones, like the Battle of Suomussalmi, but also some less well known battles, like the Battle of Partakoski and Kärnäkoski passes. After that we will look at flags and emblems, as the military like that sort of thing there are many fascinating badges and flags around. Far too many for this book so I will just give a taste. Then we will go on to museums before looking briefly at models.I hope to inspire people to go out and visit these places themselves; see the battlefields and museums. This book is meant as a teaser, there is far more to see and do between the empires than I could possibly put into a book. So, enjoy ...

This tribute to the life of Jerzy Dobiecki, a Polish cavalry captain with the 18-ty Pu?k U?anów Pomorskich – the 18th Polish Pomeranian Lancers, is a story based on previously archived material, originally written by the Captain in Polish, then translated for the first time into English. The Captain's chronicles bring to life eye-witness accounts of his regiment's deployments during the Russo-Polish War between 1919 and 1921, one of several little-publicized wars in English and for Poland and her neighbors immediately following the 1914-1918 Great War. Eighteen years later, as Poland was invaded by Germany in September 1939, from his position on attachment to the Polish Ministry of Military Affairs in Warsaw, Colonel Dobiecki kept a diary of battles as they developed across Poland during the first weeks of the Second World War. The diary records events as he, and what remained of the Polish military High Command, were evacuated to neighboring Romania which was additionally overrun by Soviet forces from the east. His journal sheds light on his subsequent escape from internment across Europe to France and later on to Britain, where he served as a staff officer with the command of the Polish 1st Army in Scotland. Following the end of hostilities in Europe in 1945 and upon return to Britain after the fighting on the continent, like thousands of other Poles commissioned under the auspices of the Polish Resettlement Corps, Jerzy had to decide whether to return to his native Poland or whether he should try to somehow rescue and bring to England what was left of his family – now trapped behind the iron curtain in eastern Poland, facing an uncertain future and severity under a Stalinist regime.
