Geographical offender profiling is an area of criminological and psychological research where the location of an offender's home is inferred by how the crime scenes are geographically dispersed. The research shows a clear connection between the offender's residence or occupational location and the offender's crime scene locations, although no research has been done into connections between other places the offender has a connection with and crime scene locations. The aim of this exploratory study is to examine whether the distance between the crime scene and different anchor points of an offender, such as a parent's residence or a sibling's residence, is related. This is important because it can give a better overview of the movements of offenders and might lead to law enforcement arresting an offender earlier, which can save lives, time, and money. The study analyzed 18 police files involving cases of serial sexual homicide. Results indicate that the distance from the arrest site to the crime scenes is the shortest distance, while the offender's child's mother's residence is the farthest away from the crime scenes. The parental (both parents live here) residence, paternal (only the father lives here), and maternal (only the mother lives here) residence, show interesting results in that the paternal residence is the closest to the crime scenes. The parental residence was the farthest away from the crime scenes while the maternal residence falls in between the paternal and parental residences. The distance between the homicide and disposal site in a series increased in most cases, while car theft and car recovery sites, and abduction and captivity sites decrease in distance.

This literature-based dissertation focuses on the efficacy of geographic profiling methods. It aims to find out if recent geographic profiling methods are really supportive to the criminal investigative process and to what extent they can contribute to solve criminal cases. As a structured literature review, it seeks to evaluate the relevant evidence about the use of geographic profiling in terms of criminal detection and practical investigative applicability. This is done by using other completed literature reviews or research reviews, including evidence from these reviews and, additionally, by reviewing the use of GIS (Geographic Information Systems) in recent criminal cases. This dissertation provides an insight into recent applications of geographic profiling and a presentation of the main profiling systems. The results of this dissertation are achieved by evaluating and comparing data from empirical research and by reviewing the evidence about the efficacy of this technique. The efficacy and relative success of the application of geographic profiling in criminal investigations are supported by presenting a range of criminal cases solved with the contribution of geographic profiling using methods. On the other hand, deficiencies in geographic profiling systems and applications are shown by the presentation of several other independent studies.

Overall, this dissertation concludes that the evidence reviewed suggests that geographic profiling can contribute to solve criminal cases to a crucial extent, i.e. in cases of locating the offender's base or predicting where the next offence location is to be found, and thus, this thesis gives strong support for the use of geographic profiling in criminal justice investigations. Finally, the evidence also points to a growing importance of predictive crime prevention applications of this technology in future.

Most incidents of violent crime occur between people who know each other, but in other cases (fortunately much less frequent) there are no obvious ties between the victim and the criminal, and these cases cause a great deal of social fear and uncertainty. They also result in large-scale, costly investigations and, increasingly, police are collaborating with other professionals in a process of offender profiling which might help their investigation. This book is a substantial, unique and critical account of the scope and practice of offender profiling, and its limitations. This essay is a short overview of some essential elements of the Geographical Offender Profiling, like the theoretical framework of the geography of crime applied to investigation, the importance of geographic role of offender's home base during the crime site selection, the spatial strategy of crime distribution, the «geographical crime scene». The investigative implications carry out from these considerations are the need to investigate the person-places-time interlacement, the geographical interrelationships of the crime locations, and to analyze the crime from a criminological-geospatial perspective, i.e. another piece of the investigative puzzle that makes the investigative inferences potentially stronger.
