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well as featuring in a number of TV and film documentaries! was born in Manchester when music first went 'pop' and the teenager made its first appearance in society. I left school at the earliest opportunity without any qualifications

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and very little interest in education or even reading. I worked in a photographic studio for one year before joining my father as a window cleaner which I worked at for the next ten years. I fell in love with rock music at an early age and

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regardless of my
lack of education
produced two
magazines. 'Purple
Smoke' an arts
magazine and the
aforementioned
'Penetration Rock
Magazine' as a
consequence of this
and my association
with the music
scene I quickly took

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the alcohol, drugs
and backstage pass
route to
oblivion. When
people would be
talking about
whether their glass
was half empty or
half full I didn't need
to ponder the
question as I'd be at
the bar getting a top
up. Along the way

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with the help of several girlfriends and a large dose of realisation I decided to try and educate myself and improve myself as a person in general. I later became interested in comedy and spent fifteen years writing sketches for popular TV shows

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both in the UK and in Germany.
