Applications of quantum field theoretical methods to gravitational physics, both in the semiclassical and the full quantum frameworks, require a

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careful formulation of the fundamental basis of quantum theory, with special attention to such important issues as renormalization, quantum theory of gauge theories, and especially effective action formalism. The first part of this graduate textbook provides both a

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conceptual and technical introduction to the theory of quantum fields. The presentation is consistent, starting from elements of group theory, classical fields, and moving on to the effective action formalism in general gauge theories. Compared to other existing

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books, the general formalism of renormalization is described in more detail, and special attention is paid to gauge theories. This part can serve as a textbook for a one-semester introductory course in quantum field theory. In the second part, we discuss

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basic aspects of quantum field theory in curved space, and perturbative quantum gravity. More than half of Part II is written with a full exposition of details, and includes elaborated examples of simplest calculations. All chapters include exercises ranging

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from very simple ones to those requiring small original investigations. The selection of material of the second part is done using the “must-know” principle. This means we included detailed expositions of relatively simple techniques and calculations,

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expecting that the interested reader will be able to learn more advanced issues independently after working through the basic material, and completing the exercises.

Cognitive Linguistics is an approach to language study based on the

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assumptions that our linguistic abilities are firmly rooted in our cognitive abilities, that meaning is essentially conceptualization, and that grammar is shaped by usage. The Handbook of Cognitive Linguistics provides state-of-the-art overviews of the numerous

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subfields of cognitive linguistics
written by leading international experts
which will be useful for established
researchers and novices alike. It is an
interdisciplinary project with
contributions from linguists,
psycholinguists, psychologists, and

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computer scientists which will emphasise the most recent developments in the field, in particular, the shift towards more empirically-based research. In this way, it will, we hope, help to shape the field, encouraging methodologically more

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rigorous research which incorporates insights from all the cognitive sciences.

This book examines the

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question of whether languages can differ in grammatical complexity and, if so, how relative complexity differences might be measured. The volume differs from

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others devoted to the question of complexity in language in that the authors all approach the problem from the point of view of formal grammatical theory,

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psycholinguistics, or
neurolinguistics.

Chapters investigate a
number of key issues in
grammatical complexity,
taking phonological,
morphological,

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syntactic, and semantic considerations into account. These include what is often called the 'trade-off problem', namely whether complexity in one

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grammatical component is necessarily balanced by simplicity in another; and the question of interpretive complexity, that is, whether and how one might measure the

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difficulty for the hearer in assigning meaning to an utterance and how such complexity might be factored in to an overall complexity assessment. Measuring

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interdisciplinary approach, which is reflected in the various topics covered, gives students a global picture of the field. Topics range from early childhood intellectual development to educational

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and social-cognitive challenges to the maturing bilingual brain. Important developing areas such as cognitive aging, creativity, the social and cultural context perspective,

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communication disorders and sentence processing are also covered within the volume. This text is aimed towards undergraduate courses and graduate courses in psycholinguistics,

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especially those with an emphasis on bilingualism or second language learning. Analogical Modeling (AM) is an exemplar-based general theory of description that uses both neighbors and non-

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neighbors (under certain well-defined conditions of homogeneity) to predict language behavior. This book provides a basic introduction to AM, compares the theory with

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nearest-neighbor approaches, and discusses the most recent advances in the theory, including psycholinguistic evidence, applications to specific languages, the problem of

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categorization, and how AM relates to alternative approaches of language description (such as instance families, neural nets, connectionism, and optimality theory). The book

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closes with a thorough examination of the problem of the exponential explosion, an inherent difficulty in AM (and in fact all theories of language description).

Quantum computing (based

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on quantum mechanics with its inherent simultaneity and reversibility) provides a precise and natural solution to the exponential explosion in AM. Finally, an extensive appendix provides three

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tutorials for running the AM
computer program

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This books aims to open up new perspectives in the study of language proficiency by bringing together current research from different fields in psychology and linguistics. All contributions start out

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*from empirical studies,
which are then related to
applications in language
assessment. The book also
serves as a survey of recent
developments in
psycholinguistic research in
the Netherlands. The book*

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starts out with a thorough introduction of international literature on models of language proficiency, language development and its assessment. Section 1 deals with first language

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proficiency and addresses such problems as grammar in early child language, grammatical proficiency and its (in)variance across a range of ages, reading abilities, and writing skills. Section 2 focuses on

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multilingual proficiency and deals with test bias in relation to the background of the second language learner, bilingual proficiency in ethnic minority children, the development of the second

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*language learner lexicon,
communicative competence of
school-age children in the
context of second language
learning, the assessment of
foreign language attrition
and the dimensionality in
oral foreign language*

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proficiency.

Almost four decades have passed since "Formal Grammars" first appeared in 1974. At that time it was still possible to rather comprehensively review for (psycho)linguists the

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relevant literature on the theory of formal languages and automata, on their applications in linguistic theory and in the psychology of language. That is no longer feasible. In all three areas developments

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have been substantial, if not breathtaking. Nowadays, an interested linguist or psycholinguist opening any text on formal languages can no longer see the wood for the trees, as it is by no means evident which formal,

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mathematical tools are really required for natural language applications. An historical perspective can be helpful here. There are paths through the wood that have been beaten since decades; they can still

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provide useful orientation. The origins of these paths can be traced in the three volumes of "Formal Grammars," brought together in the present re-edition. In a newly added postscript the author has sketched what

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has become, after all these years, of formal grammars in linguistics and psycholinguistics, or at least some of the core developments. This chapter may provide further motivation for the reader to

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*make a trip back to some of
the historical sources.
