For Cuba's supporters, health is the most commonly cited evidence of the socialist system's success. Even critics often concede that this is the country's saving grace. Cuba's health statistics are indeed extraordinary. This small island outperforms virtually all of its neighboring countries and all countries of the same level of economic development. Some of its health statistics rival wealthy industrialized countries. Moreover, these health outcomes have resulted against all odds. Setting out to unravel this puzzle, the author finds that Cuba possesses an unusually high level of popular participation and cooperation in the implementation of health policy. This has been achieved with the help of a longstanding government that prioritizes public health, and has enough political influence to compel the rest of the community to do the same. On the other hand, popular participation in decision-making regarding health policy is minimal, which contrasts with the image of popular participation often promoted. Political elites design and impose health policy, allowing little room for other health sector groups to meaningfully contribute to or protest official decisions. This is a problem because aspects of health care that are important to those who use the system or work within it can be neglected if they do not fit within official priorities. The author remains, overall, supportive of health achievement in Cuba. The country's preventive arrangements, its collective prioritization of key health areas, the improvements in public access to health services through the expansion of health facilities and the provision of free universal care are among the accomplishments that set it apart. The sustainability and progress of these achievements, however, must involve open recognition and public discussion of weaker aspects of the health system.

This book explores, in a manner that is readily accessible to those with little or no formal training in philosophy or theology, important questions concerning the rationality of belief in miracles. This book employs the time-honored literary device of dialogue, a practice that dates as far back as Plato. Done well, this form of philosophical investigation puts forward a thesis, yet genuinely engages with the views its author opposes. These dialogues are intended to provide a philosophical defense of the possibility of rationally justified belief in miracles. Such a defense can legitimately dispense with much of the paraphernalia that professional scholars in a discipline use in writing for other professional scholars in their discipline--some scholarly texts seem to be more references than argument--but it must not "dumb down" the material by oversimplifying the issues, or presenting "straw man" versions of the arguments it seeks to refute. My hope is that not only those who are already convinced of the rationality of belief in miracles will read this book, but also those who are unconvinced.

Do miracles still happen today? This book demonstrates that miraculous works of God, which have been part of the experience of the church around the world since Christianity began, continue into the present. Leading New Testament scholar Craig Keener addresses common questions about miracles and provides compelling reasons to believe in them today, including many accounts that offer evidence of verifiable miracles. This book gives an accessible and concise overview of one of Keener's most significant research topics. His earlier two-volume work on miracles stands as the definitive word on the topic, but its size and scope are daunting to many readers. This new book summarizes Keener's basic argument but contains substantial new material, including new accounts of the miraculous. It is suitable as a textbook but also accessible to church leaders and laypeople.

A theology in tune with postcolonial theory has the potential to creatively inform and transform ecclesial practice. Focusing on the relationship to postcolonial theory, *Postcolonial Theologies* brings together a wide diversity of authors, many of them fresh and exciting theological voices that are stunningly creative and prophetically lucid. Humans are hopeless in the war against COVID-19. We want to explore the root cause that medicine fails to find effective measures for the COVID-19 pandemic. We found this failure can be traced to the publication practices of leading medical journals. Their practice, which is driven by money, has resulted in very narrow medical treatment options, an invalid pool of medical research articles which are full of errors and inaccuracies. A large number of problems arise from their business model. The publishers make profits by charging access fees and subscriptions. Each research article is an end product of large investment, and thus academics have strong interest to see their articles published while the publishers want to make the largest amount of money. Those two interests inevitably turn the publishers' business model into a money trade that is a root evil for turning medicine into a money science with no merit for curing diseases. The unique position of the publishers from their power to decide article merit. Their article selection standards are heavily influenced by how articles affect their revenues; and they are reluctant for them to resist changes to existing medical theories and practices. Since their revenues are derived from medical industrial revenues, they have inherent incentives to promote medical industrial revenues, exclude competing arts, preclude non-medical measures, and promote medical treatments. Their revenue-driving biases are reflected in their editorial policies, review practices and rejection mechanisms. Their roles in medicine are reflected in the funding levels of research projects covered in published articles, commercial potential of published medical research, name-promoting efforts, compositions of published articles, and changing medical concepts reflected in their published articles. By influencing the medical landscape for decades, the publishers have turned medicine into an extremely narrow art together with a pool of medical evidence that is often obsolete, inaccurate, or even wrong. Medicine becomes money science with no chance of finding predictable cures. By excluding a vast number of potential options, medical treatments are selected from a roomful of "small dwarfs". The medical treatments they have brought to the market are the best, and nor scientifically valid. This publishing-for-money trade has the effects of perpetually protecting medical flaws, obsolete theories, and medical practices. By excluding non-medical options from medicine, their narrow revenue-generating treatment options cannot cure chronic diseases like cancer and COVID-19 diseases other than relieving symptoms. To defend the poor performance of their treatments, they mold a public narrative that chronic diseases are incurable and all other treatments are unsafe. By relying on incomplete and invalid evidence, governments could not

problems, and are thus unable to correct flaws in the foundation of medicine. Society could not use cheaper, safer and more powerful treatments for many diseases. By recognizing research standards disclosed in their published articles as the only standards, federal agencies, foundations and other organizations keep throwing massive research funds onto the same or similar types of research that has failed time and again. The failure is reflected in the whole field from cancer, to chronic diseases, to infectious diseases. The research model is flawed in the use of popular separation of mind and body, single factor-based approach, use of the two-value system, etc. A large number of medical theories and practices including most cancer theories, use of surgery to remove cancer, use of chemotherapy to kill cancer cells, use of drugs to control high blood pressure, the epidemiological model (RO), etc. are all incorrect or grossly inaccurate. When massive errors and inaccuracies are not corrected, it hinders medicine to find cures for challenging diseases. Whatever the medical publishers do are to improve the perception of their articles but not merit for curing diseases. Estimated 30 million premature deaths in the world could be attributed to the failure of medicine. Most of the COVID-19 and most of the economic damages to the U.S. could have been avoided but for reliance on the narrower, invalid often harmful treatments. The mankind is paying ultimate prices in human lives and economy because governments and societies blindly rely on the medical evidence which is a product of the publishing-for-money trade. By continuing relying on such incomplete evidence, human beings continue certain catastrophes could have an effect of brewing future civilization catastrophes. We urge all national governments to take actions necessary to expand the original scope, protect disruptive medical discoveries, encourage competing arts, and restore the medical evidence scope to include all the sources.

Western society is in crisis, the result of our culture's embrace of naturalism and postmodernism. At the same time, the biblical worldview is pushed to the margins. Christians have been strongly influenced by these trends, with the result that the personal lives of Christians are more surrounding culture more than the way of Christ, and the church's transforming influence on society has waned. Most modern prejudice against biblical miracle reports depends on David Hume's argument that uniform human experience precluded miracles. Yet current research shows that human experience is far from uniform. In fact, hundreds of millions of people today claim to have experienced miracles. New Testament scholar Craig Keener argues that it is time to rethink Hume's argument in light of the contemporary evidence available to us. This wide-ranging and meticulously researched two-volume study presents the most thorough current defense of the credibility of the miracle reports in the Gospels*

*and Acts. Drawing on claims from a range of global cultures and taking a multidisciplinary approach to the topic, Keener suggests that many miracle accounts throughout history and from contemporary times are best explained as genuine divine acts, lending credence to the biblical miracle reports. Plastic Madonnas, packaged holy tours, and biblical theme parks can arouse discomfort, laughter, and even revulsion in religious believers and nonbelievers alike. Scholars, too, often see the intermingling of religion and commerce as a corruption of true spirituality. Suzanne K. Kaufman challenges these assumptions in her examination of the Lourdes pilgrimage in late nineteenth-century France. Consuming Visions offers new ways to interpret material forms of worship, female piety, and modern commercial culture. Kaufman argues that the melding of traditional pilgrimage activities with a newly developing mass culture produced fresh expressions of popular faith. For the devout women of humble origins who flocked to the shrine, this intensely exciting commercialized worship offered unprecedented opportunities to connect with the sacred and express their faith in God. New devotional activities at Lourdes transformed the act of pilgrimage: the train became a moving chapel, and popular entertainments such as wax museums offered vivid recreations of visionary events. Using the press and the strategies of a new advertising industry to bring a mass audience to Lourdes, Church authorities remade centuries-old practices of miraculous healing into a modern public spectacle. These innovations made Lourdes one of the most visited holy sites in Catholic Europe. Yet mass pilgrimage also created problems. The development of Lourdes, while making religious practice more democratically accessible, touched off fierce conflicts over the rituals and entertainments provided by the shrine. These conflicts between believers and secularists played out in press scandals across the European continent. By taking the shrine seriously as a site of mass culture, Kaufman not only breaks down the opposition between sacred and profane but also deepens our understanding of commercialized religion as a fundamental feature of modernity itself.*
