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for readers' convenience. When read in sequence, the book provides a comprehensive, holistic sense of Yorùbá creativity where riddles are concerned. At the same time, the book is conceived in a way that each

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chapter could be
read individually.

Edward D. Hoch
was and is the

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undisputed master
of the mystery
short story. His
total output of
published short
fiction hovers just
under 1,000 stories
(estimates are in
the neighborhood
of 960 stories).
Hoch (pronounced
"Hoke") is best
remembered for

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his fair-play and
impossible crime
short stories,
particularly the
series featuring Dr.
Sam Hawthorne, a
small-town
physician who
unraveled
seemingly
impossible
"problems" in
1920s New

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England. His other popular series characters included British Intelligence codebreaker Jeffrey Rand and thief-for-hire Nick Velvet. While a vast majority of Ed Hoch's stories were mysteries, he enjoyed horror and

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science fiction. Of his nine-hundred-plus output, he wrote several handfuls of horror and science fiction stories that appeared in various magazines and anthologies. It could be argued that his first published story,

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"Village of the
Dead" (which
appeared in the
December 1955
issue of the pulp
magazine Famous
Detective Stories),
is as much horror
as it is a mystery.
In that story, the
mass suicide of an
entire village is
investigated by

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Simon Ark, a mysterious—possibly two-thousand year old—Coptic Priest. Here, then, are 31 tales of the future, the fantastic, and the improbable by a master of the craft: Edward D. Hoch, writer extraordinaire!

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world that science has provided to date? The God presented by most religions doesn't make sense in today's world; we have little room for miracles.

Furthermore, there are irreconcilable aspects in the

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world's religions.
Must we abandon
our faith or belief in
God? Perhaps not,
says popular
Swedish thinker
Stefan Einhorn. We
can behave as
scientists do when
they run
experiments only to
obtain contradictory

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results. They ask themselves whether there might not be a logical conclusion that binds all the results together and leads to the most probable explanation.

Einhorn hypothesizes that if God truly exists,

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then many different religions would have discovered this. He finds a common denominator in the concept of a hidden God in seven major religions: Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism,

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and Confucianism.
But even with this shared belief, can we know if God exists? Did humankind create the idea of God to answer the unexplainable? What about evil and suffering, the absence of meaning

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in life, loneliness
and insecurity? And
most importantly,
how do we search
for a concealed
God? Most religions
share common
principles for the
search for "that
which is
concealed,"
including

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meditation,
contemplation, and
prayer. Whatever
route is chosen, the
search for God may
bring us some
answers. Einhorn
concludes that two
themes are central
to the search: one is
that God is both
concealed and

simultaneously
omnipresent; the
other is that only
with utter humility
and an awareness of
our inability to fully
understand may we
approach the divine.
In the end, there are
no definite answers.
But the search
sheds light on the

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many paths to enlightenment offered by the world's religions. Futurists speculate that we are heading towards a 'singularity,' where AI will outsmart human beings, and humanity will coalesce into a

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single, ever-expanding mind for which data is everything. The idea mirrors conceptions of God as everything, singular, and all-knowing. But is this idea of the singularity, or God, good for humanity?

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Oneness has its attractions. But what space does it leave for individuality and difference? In this book, British-Jewish theologian, Harris Bor, explores these questions by applying approaches to

Benedict Spinoza
(1632–1677) and

With the publication of the present volume, the Handbook of the History of Logic turns its attention to the rise of modern logic. The period covered is 1685-1900, with this volume carving out the territory from Leibniz to Frege.

What is striking about

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this period is the earliness and persistence of what could be called 'the mathematical turn in logic'. Virtually every working logician is aware that, after a centuries-long run, the logic that originated in antiquity came to be displaced by a new approach with a

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dominantly

mathematical

character. It is,

however, a substantial

error to suppose that

the mathematization

of logic was, in all

essentials, Frege's

accomplishment or, if

not his alone, a

development ensuing

from the second half

of the nineteenth

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Answer
century. The mathematical turn in logic, although given considerable torque by events of the nineteenth century, can with assurance be dated from the final quarter of the seventeenth century in the impressively prescient work of Leibniz. It is true that,

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*in the three hundred
year run-up to the
Begriffsschrift, one
does not see a
smoothly continuous
evolution of the
mathematical turn, but
the idea that logic is
mathematics, albeit
perhaps only the most
general part of
mathematics, is one
that attracted some*

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*degree of support
throughout the entire
period in question.*

*Still, as Alfred North
Whitehead once noted,
the relationship
between mathematics
and symbolic logic
has been an "uneasy"
one, as is the present-
day association of
mathematics with
computing. Some of*

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*this unease has a
philosophical texture.*

*For example, those
who equate
mathematics and logic
sometimes disagree
about the
directionality of the
purported identity.*

*Frege and Russell
made themselves
famous by insisting
(though for different*

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*reasons) that logic
was the senior
partner. Indeed
logicism is the view
that mathematics can
be re-expressed
without relevant loss
in a suitably framed
symbolic logic. But for
a number of thinkers
who took an algebraic
approach to logic, the
dependency relation*

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*was reversed, with
Answer
mathematics in some
form emerging as the
senior partner. This
was the precursor of
the modern view that,
in its four main
precincts (set theory,
proof theory, model
theory and recursion
theory), logic is
indeed a branch of
pure mathematics. It*

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*would be a mistake to
leave the impression*

that the

*mathematization of
logic (or the*

logicization of

*mathematics) was the
sole concern of the*

history of logic

between 1665 and

1900. There are, in

this long interval,

aspects of the modern

and Hegel make clear.

Peirce was himself
a physical scientist.
He worked as an
assistant at the
Harvard
Astronomical
Observatory from
1869 to 1872 and
made a series of
astronomical
observations there

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from 1872 to 1875.

Solon I. Bailey says
of these

observations, "The
first attempt at the
Harvard

Observatory to
determine the form
of the Milky Way,
or the galactic
system, was made
by Charles S.

Peirce....The
investigation was of

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Answer
a pioneer nature,
founded on scant
data." Peirce also
made major
contributions in
fields as diverse as
mathematical logic
and psychology. C.
I. Lewis has
remarked that "the
head and font of
mathematical logic
are found in the
calculus of

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propositional
Answer
functions as
developed by
Peirce and
Schroeder." Peirce
subsequently
invented, almost
from whole cloth,
semiotics - the
science of the
meaning of signs.
Ogden and
Richards, the
British critics, say

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that "by far the most elaborate and determined attempt to give an account of signs and their meanings is that of the American logician C. S. Peirce, from whom William James took the idea and the term Pragmatism, and whose Algebra of Dyadic Relations
