The book is very research-oriented and includes a great deal of new research on topics such as natural healing in addicted clients, self-management of mental illness, a positive view of change in clients diagnosed with mental illness, the effectiveness of self-help groups, research on resilience in children and adults who have experienced life traumas, research on the importance of spirituality and religious involvement,

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and new research data on the helping process. Most of research used in this book has been published since 2000. This, in effect, provides an evidence-based approach to the material in the book. Because the book shows the application of the strengths perspective

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in practice, Dr. Glicken includes examples showing how to apply the approach with complex client problems including abuse, domestic violence, mental illness, addictions, and other complex problems often dealt with by clinicians in the helping professions. The book is written for the helping professions and includes the work of Martin Seligman in Psychology on learned optimism, Robert Putnam on community life in America, and Dennis

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Saleebey, one of the original writers on the strengths perspective in social work.

For use as a text in foundations generalist social policy courses, either at the baccalaureate or master's level, this book examines the process of defining need, analyzing social policy, and developing new policy. A clear philosophical base and a common theoretical framework underlie the discussion of each component of the

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policy process.
