I can have a pretty one-track mind and so I just wrote a blank postcard that a friend of mine had brought back from a recent trip to his Hawaii. I jotted a note to Carla along with the cryptic note "82884WBWBTAWOOW" tucked away in the bottom right-hand corner. It looked like a postal code, and no one but me knew that it stood for "We will be there after our wedding day, 8/28/84." Inside I wrote what I wanted, but outside there wasn't a chance I would let anyone know. As much as I was drawn to a life together with Carla, I didn't yet want her to know! It was pretty bold of me (or maybe psycho), considering it was three years prior to our proposed Hawaiian honeymoon.1 But I was so smitten by Carla I could have penned the note with my own testosterone. Rereading that postcard today you can tell that we did not I know each other all that well, but every encounter I had with Carla (all two of them!) left me more captivated by this woman. Chevy Chase was considered for the role of Otter, but it wound up going to the lesser-known Tim Matheson. John Belushi, for his unforgettable role as Bluto, made \$40,000 (the movie's highest-paid actor). For four weeks in the fall of 1977, the actors and crew invaded the college town of Eugene, Oregon, forming their own sort of fraternity in the process. The hilarious, unforgettable movie they produced went on earning more than \$600 million and became one of America's most beloved comedy classics. It launched countless careers and paved the way for today's comedies from directors such as Judd Apatow and Todd Phillips. Bestselling author Matty Simmons was the founder of National Lampoon and the producer of Animal House.
