The School and Society

In questo studio sui percorsi di studio universitario si è voluto indagare una particolare prospettiva della didattica d'aula: la dimensione di "senso di comunità" negli insegnamenti universitari. In particolare si è voluto approfondire quanto le didattiche previste dagli insegnamenti del corso di Laurea triennale in Scienze dell'Educazione e della Formazione di Sapienza, Università degli studi di Roma, promuovano attività tipiche di un attivismo pedagogico, coinvolgendo l'allievo in forme di apprendimento collaborativo, costruendo identità di gruppo e fornendo livelli di integrazione e cooperazione tra i corsisti. Il senso di comunità rappresenta un fattore determinante dello sviluppo di un contesto comunitario, in quanto favorisce l'integrazione tra gli studenti e contribuisce a rafforzare l'identità sociale degli stessi, apportando benefici al processo di apprendimento. Lo studio del senso di comunità è una pista di ricerca assolutamente nuova per i contesti universitari, forse perché canonicamente più vicini a forme di didattica frontale, con comunicazioni di tipo asimmetrico e scarse possibilità di confronto durante le lezioni. La ricerca è stata condotta attraverso la somministrazione di una scala standardizzata sul senso di comunità in classe (Rovai, 2002; nel suo adattamento in lingua italiana, 2015) a 418 studenti nei due semestri dell'a.a. 2015/2016. A questa modalità di rilevazione strutturata è stata affiancata una modalità di rilevazione di tipo osservativo, mettendo a punto una scheda con indicatori di natura qualitativa (Scheda per la valutazione del senso di comunità, SVSC) utilizzata dagli studenti partecipanti al gruppo di esercitazione di ricerca. Per riflettere e analizzare atteggiamenti, dinamiche, proposte didattiche dei docenti che possono essere rilevanti per la costruzione in aula di un ambito comunitario e collaborativo, sono state condotte "osservazione strutturate in aula" durante gli 8 corsi previsti per le matricole nei due semestri dell'a.a. 2015/2016. Il volume include anche la prosecuzione del monitoraggio, ormai decennale, iniziato con la riforma degli ordinamenti didattici (D.M. 270/04) delle matricole che il corso di laurea in Scienze dell'Educazione e della Formazione

dell'Università Sapienza di Roma porta avanti da anni al fine di conoscere più da vicino i nuovi iscritti. Il questionario "nuovi iscritti" con poche domande e una somministrazione online permette di analizzare le caratteristiche degli studenti, la loro anagrafica, ma soprattutto le loro aspettative e motivazioni in ingresso. Questo tipo di monitoraggio aiuta negli anni ad "indagare" le caratteristiche delle matricole, per poter disporre quegli interventi correttivi o integrativi necessari a migliorare l'offerta formativa, o semplicemente per tener conto delle differenze specifiche, e negli anni, dei destinatari di quelle azioni didattiche e interventi organizzativi che un Corso di laurea programma e monitora.

The basic concepts of Authentic Movement are expressed for the first time in one volume through interviews and conversations with these important figures, and their key papers. They emphasize the importance of movement as a means of communication, particularly unconscious or 'authentic' movement, emerging when the individual has a deep, self-sensing awareness - an attitude of 'inner listening'. Italo Calvino was due to deliver the Charles Eliot Norton lectures at Harvard in 1985-86, but they were left unfinished at his death. The surviving drafts explore of the concepts of Lightness, Quickness, Multiplicity, Exactitude and Visibility (Constancy was to be the sixth) in serious yet playful essays that reveal Calvino's debt to the comic strip and the folktale. With his customary imagination and grace, he sought to define the virtues of the great literature of the past in order to shape the values of the future. This collection is a brilliant précis of the work of a great writer whose legacy will endure through the millennium he addressed. Italo Calvino, one of Italy's finest postwar writers, has delighted readers around the world with his deceptively simple, fable-like stories. Calvino was born in Cuba in 1923 and raised in San Remo, Italy; he fought for the Italian Resistance from 1943-45. His major works include Cosmicomics (1968), Invisible Cities (1972), and If on a winter's night a traveler (1979). He died in Siena in 1985, of a brain hemorrhage.

In this brilliant and widely acclaimed work, Peter Burke presents a social and cultural history of the Italian Renaissance. He discusses the social and political institutions which existed in Italy during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries and he analyses the ways of thinking and seeing which characterized this period of extraordinary artistic creativity. Developing a distinctive sociological approach, Peter Burke is concerned with not only the finished works of Michelangelo, Raphael, Leonardo da Vinci and others, but also with the social background, patterns of recruitment and means of subsistence of this "cultural elite." An investigation into the possibility of impossible languages, searching for the indelible "fingerprint" of human language. Can there be such a thing as an impossible human language? A biologist could describe an impossible animal as one that goes against the physical laws of nature (entropy, for example, or gravity). Are there any such laws that constrain languages? In this book, Andrea Moro—a distinguished linguist and neuroscientist—investigates the possibility of impossible languages, searching, as he does so, for the indelible "fingerprint" of human language. Moro shows how the very notion of impossible languages has helped shape research on the ultimate aim of linguistics: to define the class of possible human languages. He takes us beyond the boundaries of Babel, to the set of properties that, despite appearances, all languages share, and explores the sources of that order, drawing on scientific experiments he himself helped design. Moro compares syntax to the reverse side of a tapestry revealing a hidden and apparently intricate structure. He describes the brain as a sieve, considers the reality of (linguistic) trees, and listens for the sound of thought by recording electrical activity in the brain. Words and sentences, he tells us, are like symphonies and constellations: they have no content of their own; they exist because we listen to them and look at them. We are part of the data.

How lessons from kindergarten can help everyone develop the creative thinking skills needed to thrive in today's society. In kindergartens these days, children spend more time with math

worksheets and phonics flashcards than building blocks and finger paint. Kindergarten is becoming more like the rest of school. In *Lifelong Kindergarten*, learning expert Mitchel Resnick argues for exactly the opposite: the rest of school (even the rest of life) should be more like kindergarten. To thrive in today's fast-changing world, people of all ages must learn to think and act creatively—and the best way to do that is by focusing more on imagining, creating, playing, sharing, and reflecting, just as children do in traditional kindergartens. Drawing on experiences from more than thirty years at MIT's Media Lab, Resnick discusses new technologies and strategies for engaging young people in creative learning experiences. He tells stories of how children are programming their own games, stories, and inventions (for example, a diary security system, created by a twelve-year-old girl), and collaborating through remixing, crowdsourcing, and large-scale group projects (such as a Halloween-themed game called *Night at Dreary Castle*, produced by more than twenty kids scattered around the world). By providing young people with opportunities to work on projects, based on their passions, in collaboration with peers, in a playful spirit, we can help them prepare for a world where creative thinking is more important than ever before.

Lifelong Kindergarten

A bestselling modern classic—both poignant and funny—narrated by a fifteen year old autistic savant obsessed with Sherlock Holmes, this dazzling novel weaves together an old-fashioned mystery, a contemporary coming-of-age story, and a fascinating excursion into a mind incapable of processing emotions. Christopher John Francis Boone knows all the countries of the world and their capitals and every prime number up to 7,057. Although gifted with a superbly logical brain, Christopher is autistic. Everyday interactions and admonishments have little meaning for him. At fifteen, Christopher's carefully constructed world falls apart when he finds his neighbour's dog Wellington impaled on a garden fork, and he is initially blamed for the killing. Christopher decides that he will track down the real killer, and turns to his favourite fictional character, the impeccably logical Sherlock Holmes, for inspiration. But the investigation leads him down some unexpected paths and ultimately brings him face to face with the dissolution of his parents' marriage. As Christopher tries to deal with the crisis within his own family, the narrative draws readers into the workings of Christopher's mind. And herein lies the key to the brilliance of Mark Haddon's choice of narrator: The most wrenching of emotional moments are chronicled by a boy who cannot fathom emotions. The effect is dazzling, making for one of the freshest debut in years: a comedy, a tearjerker, a mystery story, a novel of exceptional literary merit that is great fun to read.

A masterwork of W. G. Sebald, now with a gorgeous new cover by the famed designer Peter Mendelsund The four long narratives in *The Emigrants* appear at first to be the straightforward biographies of four Germans in exile. Sebald reconstructs the lives of a painter, a doctor, an elementary-school teacher, and Great Uncle Ambrose. Following (literally) in their footsteps, the narrator retraces routes of exile which lead from Lithuania to London, from Munich to Manchester, from the South German provinces to Switzerland, France, New York, Constantinople, and Jerusalem. Along with memories, documents, and diaries of the Holocaust, he collects photographs—the enigmatic snapshots which stud *The Emigrants* and bring to mind family photo albums. Sebald combines precise documentary with fictional motifs, and as he puts the question to realism, the four stories merge into one unfathomable requiem.
