But he holds on, Elaine remaining loyal, until another bolt from the blue--the kidnapping and murder of their 12-year-old daughter. Here Olsen is at his dispassionate, yet concerned, best, introducing the subplot of the suspect's life (a wife beater), the course of the investigation, and the ultimate denouement of the case. In this mass-media age, many women will identify with, and perhaps be inspired by, Olsen's fine chronicle of the Gere family.
