Government communication falls into two areas, with the media and with the public. The growth in the 24 hour media, has meant that the cost of Government communications have grown considerably. The last external review of Government

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communications took place in the 2003-04 session by Sir Robert Phillis, the Chief Executive of the Guardian Media Group (<http://archive.cabinetoffice.gov.uk/gcreview/News/FinalReport.pdf>). Since that review a number of changes to the structure and focus of Government Communications has taken place. This report sets out a number of recommendations, including: when there is sensitive information, the Government should commit to return to Parliament at the earliest opportunity
