Thus such subjects as Providence, Prayer and the Ten Commandments are illuminated with telling and sometimes fascinating narratives. First, published in 1828, and passing through many editions in the last century, the book has been revised for greater usefulness today.

The Westminster Confession of Faith is a Reformed confession of faith, in the Calvinist theological tradition. Although drawn up by the 1646 Westminster Assembly, largely of the Church of England, it became and remains the 'subordinate standard' of doctrine in the Church of Scotland, and has been influential within Presbyterian churches worldwide. In 1643, the English Parliament called upon "learned, godly and judicious Divines", to meet at Westminster Abbey in order to provide advice on issues of worship, doctrine, government and discipline of the Church of England. Their meetings, over a period of five years, produced the confession of faith, as well as a Larger Catechism and a Shorter Catechism. For more than three centuries, various churches around the world have adopted the confession and the catechisms as their standards of doctrine, subordinate to the Bible.The Westminster Shorter Catechism (also known simply as the Shorter Catechism or WSC) was written in the 1640s by English and Scottish divines. This volume is the 1647 Catechism. The proof texts are from the modern ESV (English Standard Version). The ESV is based on the Masoretic text of the Hebrew Bible as found in Biblia Hebraica Stuttgartensia (2nd ed., 1983), and on the Greek text in the 1993 editions of the Greek New Testament (4th corrected ed.), published by the United Bible Societies (UBS), and Novum Testamentum Graece (27th ed.), edited by Nestle and Aland. Throughout, the translation team has benefited greatly from the massive textual resources that have become readily available recently, from new insights into biblical laws and culture, and from current advances in Hebrew and Greek lexicography and grammatical understanding. Also included is an index of subjects from the questions and answers. This 246 page volume is generous with space left on each of the pages for you to write your notes and remarks as you study over the years. The Shorter Catechism is generally divided into two parts, reflected in the response to Question 3: "What do the Scriptures principally teach? The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God, and what duty God requires of man." Questions 1 to38 address what we are to believe concerning God. Pastor James Thomson's sermon notes on these questions compiled the first part of this collection. Here in the second part we are able to read Pastor Thomson's sermon notes on Questions 39 to 107, what our duty is before God. This second section could be subdivided as well into two parts, namely Questions 45 to 85 which deal with the Ten Commandments, and Questions 85 to 107, which deal with repentance and faith in Jesus Christ. In the Preface to the first part of this collection Pastor Thomson provided a brief background on the history of the Shorter Catechism, and pointed out its value for theology, catechizing, and practice. He continues exhorting readers on these values in the remaining sections of the Catechism. As he pointed out then, and as we repeat now,

"Presbyterians armed, fed, and taught by the Catechism are 'ready to give an answer for our hope.' That is why I wrote, preached, and now publish these studies." It is hoped that readers will be nourished by these sermons, as we who have heard them preached can attest to how they have already benefited us.
