In short the film is about a criminal case in America in which a young Hispanic boy is accused of killing his father and the twelve members of the jury have to decide on his verdict. In this case “ guilty ” means death. After talking about the film in more detail I will also look at the jury system in America and discuss some of its most important aspects, e.g. jury selection, possible verdicts or the principle “ Burden of Proof ” . In doing so, I will raise questions on how fair the jury system really is and what its weaknesses or points of criticism might be.
