Federal Judges Revealed

Many commentators surmise a relationship between the style of judicial opinions and their legal impact or precedential power. However, little empirical work has been done to explore this relationship quantitatively. If writing style matters legally, we should expect elements of style to vary systematically with a given decision's uptake in subsequent decisions. I employ computational and quantitative methods of analysis to uncover patterns between legal impact and stylistic features such as certainty, informality, and suspense. I derived my stylistic features of interest from the literature on judicial writing and measured their frequency or density in a sample of U.S. federal appellate opinions. I then investigated the relationship between these features and the number of cases that cite the decision. My results, generated from a series of regression analyses, suggest that readily measurable elements of style have strong associations with a decision's precedential power. In general, opinions that defy the prevailing legal writing advice are more likely to be cited than opinions that conform to that advice.

The backdrop to this new content creation are the broader changes in the media landscapes and knowledge hierarchies that ePunditry both shapes and is shaped by. Within these newly emerging ecologies the way that opinion and knowledge is produced and circulated makes ePundits highly influential but at what cost to the creator? This book explores these evolving opinion spheres from the perspective of producers acknowledging

that, in such a ruthless attention economy, to stay relevant they must keep thinking, writing and doing.
